The Secretary of Defense, The Honorable Donald H. Rumsfeld, has been invited to attend the 2002 Musket Ball to receive the first Anthony Wayne statue award for his leadership in the defense of our nation.

As Secretary of Defense he is the principal defense policy adviser to the President of the United States and is responsible for the formulation of general defense policy and policy related to all matters of direct concern to the Department of Defense, and for the execution of approved policy. Under the direction of the President, the Secretary exercises authority, direction and control over the Department of Defense. This office is also a member of the President's Cabinet and of the National Security Council.

The Musket Ball Committee, along with the Society Office, the past few weeks has been in continuous communication with Secretary Rumsfeld's Public Relation's Office waiting for a reply. As of the printing of the Fall Newsletter, the committee has still not received confirmation, but on a better note, they have not received a regret towards the Society's invitation to the Secretary either. Weekly conversations have been held between his office and the Society Office for the latest updates.

**Donald H. Rumsfeld**  
**Secretary of Defense**

Until being sworn in as the 21st Secretary of Defense, Mr. Rumsfeld was in private business. Mr. Rumsfeld attended Princeton University on scholarship (AB, 1954) and served in the United States Navy (1954-57) as a Naval aviator.

He went to Washington, DC, in 1957, during the Eisenhower Administration, to serve as Administrative Assistant to a Congressman. After a stint with an investment banking firm, he was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives from Illinois in 1962, at the age of 30, and was re-elected in 1964, 1966, and 1968.

Mr. Rumsfeld resigned from Congress in 1969 during his fourth term to serve in the Nixon Administration and in 1973, he left Washington to serve as U.S. Ambassador to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) in Brussels, Belgium (1973-74).

In August 1974, he was called back to Washington, DC, to serve in the Ford Administration.

From 1977 to 1985 he served as Chief Executive Officer, President, and then Chairman of G.D. Searle & Co., a worldwide pharmaceutical company. The successful turnaround there earned him awards as the Outstanding Chief Executive Officer in the Pharmaceutical Industry from the Wall Street Transcript (1980) and Financial World (1981). From 1985 to 1990 he was in private business.

Mr. Rumsfeld served as Chairman and CEO of General Instrument Corporation from 1990 to 1993. A leader in broadband transmission, dis-

tribution, and access control technologies for cable, satellite and terrestrial broadcasting applications, the company pioneered the development of the first all-digital high definition television (HDTV) technology. After taking the company public and returning it to profitability, Mr. Rumsfeld returned to private business in late 1993. Until being sworn in as the 21st Secretary of Defense, Mr. Rumsfeld served as Chairman of Gilead Sciences, Inc.

During his business career, Mr. Rumsfeld continued public service in a variety of posts. Civic activities included service as a member of the National Academy of Public Administration and a member of the boards of trustees of the Gerald R. Ford Foundation, the Eisenhower Exchange Fellowships, the Hoover Institution at Stanford University, and the National Park Foundation. He was also a member of the U.S./Russian Business Forum and Chairman of the Congressional Leadership's National Security Advisory Group.

In 1977, Mr. Rumsfeld was awarded the nation's highest civilian award, the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

The Musket Ball Committee and Society Office continue to be in contact with the Secretary's office awaiting an answer. The committee felt the membership should be aware of the possible appearance of Secretary Rumsfeld at the Musket Ball. However, we are all aware of the happenings going on in our world and like all good citizens must prioritize where the Secretary is needed most.

## Flag Folding Ceremony

The point of honor of the United States is a canton of blue containing the stars representing the states our friends served in uniform. The point of honor of the flag of the United States dresses from the left to the right and the only time it is inverted and displayed in the manner in which you see it, is when it comes to serve as a pall on the casket of a veteran who has served his or her country honorably in uniform.

In the evening, in the Armed Forces of the United States, at the ceremony of retreat after Taps have sounded, the flag is lowered and folded in a triangle fold, and kept under watch throughout the night as a tribute to our Nation's honored dead. The next morning it is brought out at the ceremony of reveille and run up aloft as a symbol of our belief in the resurrection of the body.

The First fold of our flag is a symbol of life.

The Second fold is a symbol of our belief in the eternal life, and this fold we make in honor and remembrance of those veterans whom we are commemorating, for they too, gave their lives for the defense of our country.

We fold to the left in the shape of a triangle, for this is where our hearts lie...and it is with our hearts we pledge allegiance to the United States of America, and the Republic for which it stands...one nation under God, Indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all.

We fold again to the left in the shape of a triangle, representing our weaker nature, for we, as American citizens, trust in God, and it is to God we turn to in time of peace, as well as in times of war for divine guidance.

We fold again to the right as a tribute to our country, for in the words of the immortal Stephen Decatur, "Our Country, in Dealing with Other Countries, May She Always be Right, But it is Still Our Country Right or Wrong."

We fold to the left as a tribute to the ones

who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day, and this fold is made to honor Mother for whom it flies on Mothers Day.

We fold again to the left as a tribute to Womenhood; for it has been through their Faith, Love, Loyalty, and Devotion that the characters of men that made this country great have been molded.

We fold to the right as a tribute to Father, for he, too, has given his son/s and daughter/s for the defense of our country since its birth.

We fold from the stripes toward the stars, for whereas, the stripes represent the original thirteen colonies that founded our Republic, they are now embodied in the fifty sovereign states represented by the stars, so that the stars cover the stripes.

We fold to the left in the shape of a triangle, for, in the eyes of a Hebrew citizen, this represents the lower portion of the Seal of David and King Solomon, and glorifies in the eyes the God of Abraham, the God of Issac, and the God of Jacob.

We fold again to the left in the shape of a triangle, for in the eyes of the Christian citizen, this represents an emblem of Eternity and Glorifies in the eyes of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

When our flag is completely folded, the stars are upper most, which reminds us of the national motto, "IN GOD WE TRUST."

After the flag is completely folded and tucked in, it takes on the appearance of a three cornered hat, ever reminding us of the soldiers who served under General George Washington, and the sailors and Marines who served under Captain John Paul Jones, and followed by their comrades and shipmates in the Armed Forces of the United States have preserved for us the rights, privileges, and freedoms which we are enjoying today.

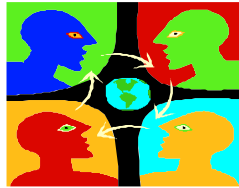

**PAOLI BATTLEFIELD DEDICATED AND OPENED TO THE PUBLIC**

In 1995 the Malvern Preparatory School put the 40 acre Paoli Battlefield site on the market and received an offer from a developer who planned to build 163 condos. This galvanized the community to try and save this historically important Revolutionary War site. A group called the Paoli Battlefield Preservation Fund was organized to raise money to protect the Battlefield from development. The 20 members included people from the Borough of Malvern and several historical organizations including the PSSR, with members Winchell Carroll and Harvard Wood, III involved in the project.

On Saturday, September 21, 2002, after 7 years and raising \$2,600,00, the Paoli Battlefield was turned over to the Borough of Malvern and opened to the public. 2,500 people attended the dedication and the reenactment of the Paoli Massacre which followed the dedication. PSSR President Cheyney was a speaker at the event along with a small contingent from the PSSR Color Guard led by Captain Richard Dana Smith, Sr. In addition, Eric Werner, Co-Chair of the Special Projects Committee was also in attendance.

The Society paid for the nine interpretive signs installed as part of the restoration of the Battlefield in addition to previously underwriting part of the cost of the publication entitled "Battle of Paoli" by Tom Maguire.

## PSSR & NATIONAL CONSTITUTION CENTER WELCOMES NEW CITIZENS

On Tuesday, September 17th, 2002, the New Citizens Committee assisted with the coordination and sponsorship of a Constitution Day Naturalization Ceremony in conjunction with the National Constitution Center. The ceremony was presided over by the Honorable R. Barclay Surrick, Presiding Judge, United States District Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania.

The missions of the New Citizens Committee is to give recognition and encouragement to new citizens of the United States. Because of their admiration for our political institutions, love of liberty and the historical ideals of our country, they persevered, often under difficult circumstances not unlike those faced by our ancestors, to become loyal Americans and productive citizens of our country.

The Constitution Day Naturalization Ceremony was an excellent opportunity to join with the National Constitution Center to work together to recognize the accomplishments of our new citizens.

The ceremony was held at the new National Constitution Center building site on Arch Street between 5th and 6th Streets. Forty-five citizens from 20 countries took the oath and proudly became United States citizens. The ceremony was lent an air of significance, which it most assuredly deserved, by the Fife and Drum and the PSSR Color Guard, which escorted the applicants from the U.S. District Court to the building site of the National Constitution Center. Richard D. Smith, Sr., Captain of the Color Guard, and Guard members Anthony Morris, VII, Coleman Sellers and Gilmore Tyson presented the Colors to President Cheyney. Before the presentation of the colors, President Cheyney addressed the new citizens and audience with remarks appropriate to the occasion. The Keystone State Boys Choir inspiringly sang the National Anthem.

The Honorable John F. Street, Mayor of Philadelphia, made welcoming remarks. Mayor Street stressed in his remarks that he is a living embodiment of America as the land of opportunity, having been born on a small farm, he became the mayor of the fifth largest city in the United States.

Norman McCall, District Adjudication's Officer, Immigration and Naturalization Service made motions and Michael Kunz, Clerk of Court, administered the Oath of Citizenship. Allan Gordon, Chancellor of the Philadelphia Bar Association, also made remarks.

Anca Faur Ghenciu, a new citizen formerly of Romania who started her speech with the simple declaration, "I am proud to be an American", made a most moving response on behalf of all the new citizens.

The Honorable R. Barclay Surrick, presiding judge, concluded by saying that the new citizens left their homes and families and "started on an uncertain journey that took a great deal of determination and tenacity" as

he looked out to Independence Hall and the new site of the National Constitution Center was being erected behind him.

After the ceremony each of the new citizens were congratulated in a receiving line as Judge Surrick handed them their citizenship papers and were given a copy of the pocket-sized booklet of the Constitution of the United States along with a small gift packet from the Society. This booklet is funded by the PSSR Color Guard.

In addition, the PSSR hosted refreshments after the ceremony and had a chance to talk to the new citizens and their families.

Chairman Steve Holt reports that he was privileged to visit with one family from Poland, a man and his wife, who were both naturalized after his grandmother and mother had become citizens. He told Steve quite emphatically that it was now "his turn." Steve offered a heartfelt congratulations to him and his family and to all the new citizens in the receiving line, as did PSSR President Cheyney.

Other PSSR members present for the ceremony were Francis Peltier and Charles Coyne along with the PSSR office staff.

You hereby declare, on oath, that you absolutely and entirely renounce and abjure all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign Prince, Potentate, State or Sovereignty, of whom or which you have heretofore been subject or citizen.

That you will support and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States of America against all enemies, foreign and domestic:

That you will bear true faith and allegiance to the same:

That you will bear arms on behalf of the United States when required by law:

That you will perform noncombatant service in the Armed Forces of the United States when required by the law:

That you will perform work of national importance under civilian direction when required by the law:

And that you take this obligation freely without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion:

So help you God. If so, say "I do" or "I affirm".

# HOLIDAY COLONIAL RECIPES FOR OUR MEMBER CHEFS



## Colonial Peanut Soup

### Ingredients:

- 2 tablespoons minced onions
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced celery
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 4 cups chicken broth
- 1/3 cup creamy peanut butter
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons dry sherry
- 2 tablespoons chopped peanuts

### Directions:

Saute onions, celery and butter until onions are transparent (3 minutes). Gradually blend flour. Slowly add 3 cups chicken broth. Stir and simmer 15 minutes. Strain; set aside.

Blend 1 cup broth with peanut butter until smooth. Add to the rest of the soup. Heat thoroughly.

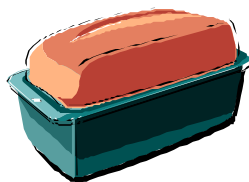
Add salt, lemon juice and sherry just before serving. Serve hot with peanut garnish. Yield 6 cups or 8 first servings.



## Colonial Gingerbread

### Ingredients:

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 cup molasses
- 3/4 cup buttermilk
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Powdered Sugar (10X)



### Directions:

Preheat oven to 325 degrees Fahrenheit. Grease and flour 9x9x2 inch pan.

Into large bowl measure all ingredients except 10X sugar, with mixer at low speed, beat until blended, constantly scraping bowl. Increase speed to medium and continue beating for 3 minutes.

Pour batter into pan and bake 1 hour or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Cool completely on wire rack.

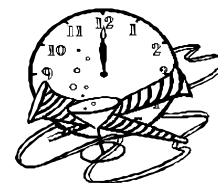
Sprinkle top with powdered sugar (10X) and serve.

### Washington Square Turnover

November 11th, 2002

The final phase of the restoration began in early September and will be completed in October, consisting of the restoration of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier of the American Revolution, the installation of a new eternal flame, landscaping, new interpretative signage and several miscellaneous improvements.

At 1:00 p.m. on Veterans Day, Monday, November 11th the National Park Service and the City of Philadelphia will sponsor a ceremony transferring operation of the Square from the Fairmount Park Commission to the Independence National Historical Park. This is clearly one of the most important additions to the NPS inventory of historical landmarks since Valley Forge was added in 1976. The NPS has invited both the U.S. President and Vice President along with other nationally known dignitaries to this event along with Mayor Street and the entire Congressional delegations from PA, DE, and NJ. The National Park Service has also asked the PSSR Color Guard to take part in the ceremony. PSSR President Cheyney has been invited to join the group on the platform.

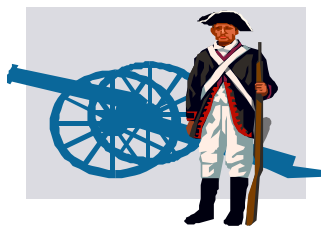
This turnover ceremony is the culmination of 11 years of effort to restore the Square. Several members of the PSSR have been directly involved as members of the American Revolution Patriots Fund, which was responsible for raising private funds for the project. Winchell S. Carroll is President and William Truscott is Treasurer. Former treasurers have included Leroy M. Lewis, III, and James Burke. PSSR provided the initial seed money for the ARPF and is paying a portion of the cost to restore the Tomb.

LANCASTER COUNTY CHAPTER

Capital Day

On Friday, September 27th, the Lancaster County Chapter celebrated Capital Day, the 225th anniversary of the day Lancaster was the Capital of the emerging United States of America. On that day in 1777, the Continental Congress, fleeing Philadelphia ahead of the British, held a session in Lancaster, PA. The following day, Congress departed to the west so as to place the Susquehanna River between themselves and the British.

This year's celebration will begin with a program held at the Jasper Yeates Education Center, a part of The Heritage Center Museum of Lancaster County, located in Lancaster, PA. The featured speaker will be historian and Manager/Editor of the York Daily Record, Mr. James McClure.

Following the program chaired by Herbert Robertson McIlvaine, Jr, a luncheon will be held at the Hamilton Club, chaired by Paul Harnish Ripple, M.D.

Jasper Yeates Center

The education center was named after Jasper Yeates, a resident of Lancaster until his death in 1871. Yeates was born in Philadelphia, graduated from the College of Philadelphia in 1761, was admitted to the bar in 1765, and was chosen a member of the Lancaster County Committee of Correspondence in 1774. He became chairman in 1776, and in 1790 was a member of the convention that ratified the Constitution of the United States. He was an associate justice of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania from 1791 until his death.
